### **Andreas Faludi, CV**

Em.Prof. of Spatial Policy Systems in Europe, Delft University of Technology, NL

Andreas Faludi (1940) studied architecture and planning at the Vienna University of Technology and did his PhD there as well. His academic career started at what is now Oxford Brooks University, followed by chairs at Delft University of Technology, the University of Amsterdam and at Radboud University Nijmegen and since 2005 back at Delft where he is now emeritus professor. He is also a Senior Professor in spatial planning at Blekinge Institute of Technology in Sweden where he was awarded an honorary doctorate. His specialisms are planning theory and methodology, the study of Dutch and also European and comparative planning. He was a British Council Scholar, an Australian-European Fellow, a Fulbright Scholar, a Fellow of the Netherlands Institute for Advanced Study in Social Science and the Humanities, a European Fulbright Scholar and a Fellow of the Bellagio Rockefeller Center and has been visiting professor at the Western Australian Institute of Technology, the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Malta, the University of Bari, the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, the University of Aalborg, Harvard University, Vienna University of Technology, the University of Vienna and the University Marseille-Aix-en-Provence III and the University Champagne-Ardennes at Reims. Publications include A Reader in Planning Theory (1973), Planning Theory (1973/1984), Critical Rationalism and Planning Methodology (1986), A Decision-centred View of Environmental Planning (1987), Rule and Order: Dutch Planning Doctrine in the Twentieth Century (with A. van der Valk, 1994), The Making of the European Spatial Development Perspective (with Bas Waterhout, 2002) and Cohesion, Coherence, Cooperation: European Spatial Planning in the Making (2010). He published in American, Australian, Austrian, Belgian, British, Canadian, Croatian, Czech, Dutch, French, German, Hungarian, Italian, Rumanian, Serbian, South-African, Spanish, and Swiss journals. He is an Honorary Member of the Royal Town Planning Institute (RTPI) and the Association of European Schools of Planning.
